- 1) Select one of the situations on the opposite side of this page (numbered 1-13)
 - 2) Use the ASK process described below.

<u>ASK</u> questions

<u>SAY</u> no to negative peer pressure

<u>KNOW</u> positive options

An example of a dialogue demonstrating this process is:

Bob: Can I see your homework?

Bill: Why do you need my homework?

Bob: I want to check my answers?

Bill: No, I don't think that's a good idea.

Bob: Hey, I really need to see your paper.

Bill: Why don't we go over your answers

together instead?

Bob: Never mind, I'll ask Sam. He's a good

friend.

Your paper must include all three steps in the ASK process. You may use two or more people in your dialogue. Make your situation as real as possible

ASK Situations

- 1. Want to come over to my house after school?
 - 2. Want to do something together tonight?
 - 3. Want to come to a party?
 - 4. Let's go to the corner store.
 - 5. Are your parent's home?
 - 6. Do you have any money?
- 7. Want to go riding with my brother in his car?
 - 8. Are you bored?
 - 9. Want to do something fun?
- 10. Let's go to the movies. My friend works there.
- 11. I see that tape you wanted for sale over there. Want me to get it for you?
 - 12. Want to come over tonight while I'm babysitting?
 - 13. Let's have some fun on the phone.
